As a historical account, *Outdoor Monuments of Manhattan: A Historical Guide* is a fascinating look at figures and events that changed New York, the United States and the world. As an aesthetic handbook it provides a compact method for studying sculpture, inspired by Ayn Rand's writings on art.
