A major difference between social psychology and sociology is evident here: our focus remained firmly on the individual's decision-making process within a specific social context. We didn't analyze societal factors contributing to bystander apathy, such as cultural norms or societal structures.

Conversely, a sociological study might investigate the same phenomenon of bystander apathy by

focusing on factors such as urban density, social cohesion within neighborhoods, and the influence of media portrayals of violence. A major difference between social psychology and sociology is that the sociological study would explore the broader societal context influencing the likelihood of intervention, rather than the cognitive processes of the individual bystanders.
